At the state-level, the Governor of California appoints the 17-member Board of California Community Colleges to oversee the entire system.

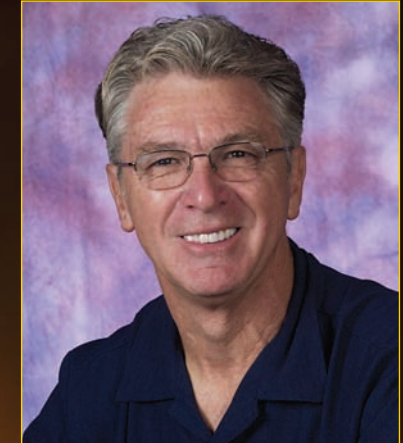

The Importance of Administering Measure “R”

To meet the needs of our rapidly growing community, voters recently passed Measure “R”, which created \$139 million in bond money for the development of the Antelope Valley Community College District (AVCC). These funds should be allocated with care towards future improvements and structures that will serve the students needs and house a variety of educational subjects. Funding from future state bond issues could provide matched funds for state supported projects. The matching of state and non-state supported projects will be important for the overall design and effectiveness of AVCC.

The plans to expand and modernize our community college district is highly detailed and requires someone with experience.
